Open to K-5 elementary teachers in the Western Regional Educator Network (WREN). This is an entry-level learning experience that will require little to no pre-knowledge of the topic in order to understand and engage with the content.



About the Professional Learning Series

This three-part learning series with Oregon Black Pioneers (OBP) supports K-5 elementary educators in bringing Oregon's Black history into their classrooms through culturally sustaining pedagogy, practical models, and collaborative planning. Throughout the series, educators will receive guided support, ready-to-use resources, and opportunities to learn with colleagues across the region.

Session 1: Teachers will explore the foundations of culturally sustaining teaching and experience an OBP model lesson featuring Letitia Carson.

Session 2: Teachers will have dedicated work time—with grade-level or topic-based breakout rooms—to help teachers adapt an OBP lesson and identify where it fits within their upcoming curriculum.

Session 3: Participants reconvene to reflect on student learning, analyze classroom data, and build a shared vision for sustaining meaningful Black history instruction across WREN districts.

Outside of Meeting Time Commitment: 3-5 hours; teachers will be asked to adapt and implement an OBP lesson.
